

News from the School Leaders:

Dear parents and carers,

We would like to welcome everyone back for the term. We hope that all families enjoyed their break, and we look forward to continuing on with positive and productive partnerships this term.

Our Parent Teacher Conference Day provided a smooth start to the term, and it was great to see so many families taking the opportunity to meet with families to discuss their child's learning and ensuring continued connections. Thank you to families for taking the time to attend these interviews. If you were unable to attend your child's interview, please contact their teacher to make an alternative time to meet.

Curriculum Day

Monday the 29th of July will be a Curriculum Day for staff. Students will not be required to attend school on this day. Professional Learning on this day will focus on one of our school priorities: Writing. We will be working with Narissa Leung on the 6+1 Traits of Writing. We will share some of our key learnings with you after this session. OSH Club will run as normal on this day.

Maths Competitions

We have a range of exciting extra-curricular competitions and opportunities for our students in Term 3. We have students in years 3-6 currently engaged in the Maths Talent Quest, where they are working individually or in small groups to investigate and apply mathematics in real world situations and problem solving. Some of the topics being explored include planning and budgeting for a holiday, investigating how much money our chickens make at year, the best angles to kick a soccer ball, how much money people might spend on buying lotto tickets in their lifetime and comparing the costs of building a castle now and then.

Our students in years 4-6 working well above the expected level are also being challenged through competitions such as the Maths Olympiad (where students compete nationally both individually and as a school team to solve problems across four competitions) and the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (designed to recognise outstanding academic achievement).

This term, we have an additional competition available for all students in years 3-6 who are working at level or above. The Australian Mathematics Competition contains unique problems designed each year by leading educators and academics to challenge and extend your students' problem-solving skills. The competition dates are between the 6th and the 8th of August and will be run during these dates, at a time that is suitable for the year level. If your child is eligible for this competition, you have been sent an online consent form via compass (in Events in your child's portal). The school will cover the cost of the assessment.

Cut of Time Canteen Change

As of Term 3, the cut off time for the canteen ordering will be **3pm**. Orders must be placed the day prior by 3pm sharp. Peppergreen catering will still be our lunch provider for White Hills Primary School. No late order will be accepted.

National Day Against Bullying

Parental controls

Learn how to use parental controls and other tools to maximise online safety in your home.

Parental controls are software tools that allow you to monitor and limit what your child sees and does online.

They can be set up to do things like:

- **Block** your child from accessing specific websites, apps or functions (like using a device's camera, or the ability to buy things).
- **Filter** different kinds of content such as 'adult' or sexual content, social media pages and pages with content that may promote self-harm, eating disorders, violence, drugs, gambling, racism and terrorism.
- **Limit** who can communicate with your child, and manage the apps they can use to communicate with others.
- Allow you to **monitor** your child's use of connected devices, with reports on the sites they visit and the apps they use, how often and for how long.
- Set **time limits**, blocking access after a set time.

A Summary of Brodie's Law

Brodie's law can apply to all forms of serious bullying, including physical bullying, psychological bullying, verbal bullying and cyber bullying.

Serious bullying may amount to a criminal offence.

In 2011, the offence of stalking in section 21A of the Crimes Act 1958 was extended to cover to behaviour that amounts to serious bullying. The offence of stalking carries a maximum penalty of 10 years imprisonment.

What behaviour leads to the application of Brodie's law?

Brodie's law can apply to all forms of serious bullying, including physical bullying, psychological bullying, verbal bullying and cyber bullying. It is not limited by the location at which the conduct occurred or was experienced by the victim. It can apply to bullying by young people in schools, although children under 10 cannot be charged with a criminal offence.

Brodie's law will apply to the most serious types of bullying behaviour. For it to apply there must be a course of conduct, that is, repeated bullying behaviour. The bully must also intend that the bullying cause physical or mental harm, including self-harm, to the victim. A possible example of when the law might apply is where a victim is repeatedly being encouraged to commit suicide.

Why is it called Brodie's law?

This law is known as 'Brodie's Law' because of a case where a young woman, Brodie Panlock, was subjected to serious and ongoing workplace bullying and eventually took her own life.
